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## ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

Daily events in our society underscore the potential impact of trauma on children and their families. We are all bombarded by the haunting specter of September 11, 2001, widespread violence in our society, anxiety associated with the volatile events of the Middle East and exposure to natural disasters such as Hurricane Andrew. There is increasing evidence that for a growing number of children such trauma exposure can have a significant, enduring impact that interferes with their current and future psychosocial adjustment. Who is most "at risk" and what can be done to help?

This conference brings together international and local experts who work with traumatized children and their families. This distinguished group of presenters will examine the incidence, nature and impact of trauma, as well as the implications for assessment, treatment and preventative interventions. They will evaluate "state of the art" methodologies and highlight techniques to avoid that may inadvertently exacerbate distress. The presentations will also consider practical ways to nurture resilience and bolster "strengths" and protective actions. Child-focused,

family-focused and community-focused interventions that can be employed in both treatment and preventative interventions will be considered.

The conference will feature practical ways to help children and families in the aftermath of natural disasters, terrorist attacks, and urban and domestic violence. Strategies to treat children with persistent anxiety disorders, children who have been victims of child abuse and those who are grieving a significant loss will be examined. The central question of what school teachers, principals, the media, parents and clinicians can do to identify and help children who are "at risk" will be addressed.

The program will include question-and-answer periods with the experts, detailed handouts and videotape demonstrations. Participants will also receive guidebooks on how to help children cope with the aftermath of terrorist attacks, and how to help keep children safe.

Please join us in this timely and critically important topic as the threat of violence and the uncertainty of the future confronts children and their families.

**Suzanne L. Keeley, Ph.D.**, is President of The Melissa Institute and a psychologist in private practice. She is also affiliated with Baptist Health South Florida. She has had extensive clinical experience treating victims and perpetrators of violence.

## PRESENTERS

**Donald Meichenbaum, Ph.D.**, is Distinguished Professor Emeritus at the University of Waterloo, Ontario, Canada and one of the founders of cognitive-behavior therapy. He has consulted and lectured worldwide on the impact of trauma and has published major clinical handbooks, *Treating Adults with Post-traumatic Stress Disorder and Treatment of Individuals with Anger-Control Problems and Aggressive Behaviors* (which often co-occur with trauma reactions). In a survey reported in the *American Psychologist*, he was voted "one of the 10 most influential psychotherapists of the century." He is Research Director of The Melissa Institute.

**Annette M. La Greca, Ph.D.**, is a Professor of Psychology and Pediatrics and Director of Clinical Training at the University of Miami. She has authored over 150 journal articles, books and book chapters related to children's and adolescents' adjustment to trauma, including *Helping America Cope: A Guide to Help Parents and Children Cope with the September 11th Terrorist Attacks*. Dr. La Greca is now working on a project on children's exposure to violence (Keeping Children Safe). She is an Associate Editor of the *Journal of Clinical and Adolescent Psychology*.



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
