





THE BATTERED-CHILD SYNDROME

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Professor and Chairman (Dr. Kempe) and Professor of Pediatrics (Dr. Silver), Department of Pediatrics; Associate Professor of Psychiatry (Dr. Steele), and Assistant Resident in Obstetrics and Gynecology (Dr. Droegemueller), University of Colorado School of Medicine; and Director, Division of Roentgenology, Children's Hospital (Dr. Silverman).

Abstract—The battered-child syndrome, a clinical condition in young children who have received serious physical abuse, is a frequent cause of permanent injury or death. The syndrome should be considered in any child exhibiting evidence of fracture of any bone, subdural hematoma, failure to thrive, soft tissue swellings or skin bruising, in any child who dies suddenly, or where the degree and type of injury is at variance with the history given regarding the occurrence of the trauma. Psychiatric factors are probably of prime importance in the pathogenesis of the disorder, but knowledge of these factors is limited. Physicians have a duty and responsibility to the child to require a full evaluation of the problem and to guarantee that no expected repetition of trauma will be permitted to occur.

THE BATTERED-CHILD SYNDROME is a term used by us to characterize a clinical condition in young children who have received serious physical abuse, generally from a parent or foster parent. The condition has also been described as "unrecognized trauma" by radiologists, orthopedists, pediatricians, and social service workers. It is a significant cause of childhood disability and death. Unfortunately, it is frequently not recognized or, if diagnosed, is inadequately handled by the physician because of hesitation to bring the case to the attention of the proper authorities.

Iconic paper from 1962: Battered-Child Syndrome

Family-Centered Care Principles

- 1. Respecting each child and his or her family
- 2. Honoring racial, ethnic, cultural, and socioeconomic diversity and its effect on the family's experience and perception of care
- 3. Recognizing and building on the strengths of each child and family, even in difficult and challenging situations
- 4. Supporting and facilitating choice for the child and family about approaches to care and support
- 5. Ensuring flexibility in organizational policies, procedures, and provider practices so services can be tailored to the needs, beliefs, and cultural values of each child and family
- 6. Sharing honest and unbiased information with families on an ongoing basis and in ways they find useful and affirming
- 7. Providing and/or ensuring formal and informal support (e.g., family-to-family support) for the child and parent(s) and/or guardian(s) during pregnancy, childbirth, infancy, childhood, adolescence, and young adulthood
- 8. Collaborating with families at all levels of health care, in the care of the individual child and in professional education, policy making, and program development
- 9. Empowering each child and family to discover their own strengths, build confidence, and make choices and decisions about their health

4 students, aged 12-15, arrested for bringing/touching two loaded guns into school



No information on the source of guns or the type of guns until appearance in court. Research confirms that children usually get their guns from home. In this case, there may be a connection to community/gang violence/scratched serial #s.

Counseling is Effective

A multisite study found that keeping a gun locked and keeping a gun unloaded have protective effects of 73% and 70%, respectively, with regard to risk of both unintentional injury and suicide for children and teenagers. These findings were consistent for both handguns and long guns (rifles and shotguns).

Counseling is Effective


A multisite randomized controlled office-based practice setting of firearm access screening & brief motivational storage counseling promoting use of cable gun locks resulted in significant increased gun safety storage practices. 22% over baseline, sustained over 6 months. 124 intervention practices.



Florida's FOPA



The newest form of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell."

Firearm Owner Privacy Act (FOPA) = Physician Gag Law = "Docs vs. Glocks"

Privacy of Firearm Owners: Provides that licensed practitioner or facility may not record firearm ownership information in patient's medical record; provides exception; provides that unless information is relevant to patient's medical care or safety or safety of others, inquiries regarding firearm ownership or possession should not be made; provides exception for EMTS & paramedics; provides that patient may decline to provide information regarding ownership or possession of firearms; clarifies that physician's authority to choose patients is not altered; prohibits discrimination by licensed practitioners or facilities based solely on patient's firearm ownership or possession; prohibits harassment of patient regarding firearm ownership during examination; prohibits denial of insurance coverage, increased premiums, or other discrimination by insurance companies issuing policies on basis of insured's or applicant's ownership, possession, or storage of firearms or ammunition; clarifies that insurer is not prohibited from considering value of firearms or ammunition in setting personal property premiums; provides for disciplinary action. Violations of the provision constitute grounds for disciplinary action (BOM). Effective: 6/2/11



Cases What do you say? What do you do?



Prenatal couple, one of the parents is law enforcement. Asking about firearm access, you learn that she is in the habit of bringing her service weapon home at night. Teen mother of a 3-1/2 y/o, who is uncomfortable with her father's gun kept over the refrigerator, but it causes family strife when they discuss it

16 y/o new patient with asthma. He checked the box that he has a gun. On further questioning, he reveals that he leaves it in his backpack. He is part of a gang and wants to get out. A rival gang is threatening him. They think he stabbed one of their members. His mother agrees to leave town, but unaware of the gang activities, she is in no rush. She wants to first build up a nest egg. Her priority is his breathing. (So is yours!)

When you asked a family if there are any firearms at home, the father said nothing, the mother said no, but did a double-take when her son said yes.

Firearm Injury: a Pediatric Problem

- Of industrialized nations, U.S. ranks #1 in firearmrelated deaths in children < 15 y/o
- 5,740 Children & teens killed by guns (2008-09)
 - 173 were preschoolers
- Disparity issue: Black youth 45% of FA deaths (15% pop.); Black males 15-19 y/o leading COD
- Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death in U.S. teens;
 > 1/2 are with firearms.

May 31, 2013 John Smith K-8 Center, Doral (Miami)



11 y/o boy brought a handgun into school. 5th grader, special needsstudent. Brought it from home. Teacher noticed it and alerted the principal.

D'Angelo Marte, 12 y/o May 24, 2013 Redlands Middle School, Homestead (Miami)



Shot in the leg when another 6th grade student tossed down his book bag and the gun inside went off. The gun came from his home.

Miami School Bus Shooting November 2012 Step Dad's Gun



Lourdes Guzman, 13 y/o

Her father shot himself a month later.



Jordyn Alexander Howe, 15 y/o

Mother says she didn't know the gun was in the house. Initially charged as an adult – three counts. The gun owner was not charged.

Recent South Florida Unintentional Child Shooting

 March 2013, Miami: Rahquel Carr, 4 y/o shot by her 6 y/ o sibling. Three children were in a car while the mother was steps away. The grandfather collapsed and was taken to a nearby hospital. The car and firearm belonged to the mother's boyfriend.

May 3, 2013

A 6 y/o Broward girl was shot by her 13 y/o brother during a game of hide and seek when they were left home alone.

Charges considered against the 13 y/o.

Too young to teach

Owen Harris, 2 y/o February 2013



Owen was found his step dad's gun left loaded in mother's purse, while the parents were sleeping. Shot himself in the face.

Pittsburgh Tribune, 2/22/13

Caroline Starks, 2 y/o in Kentucky, shot by her 5 y/o brother with his Crickett rifle. Coroner White said the child safety lock was in place and operational. "This was just a tragic accident." No charges were filed.



Firearms and Families: Dangers Not Limited to Child Access

September 22, 2014 – Miami

A 3 y/o boy is recovering from a gunshot wound to the leg during a domestic dispute at his home in northwest Miami-Dade County. Miami television stations report an acquaintance of the woman jumped a fenced and forced his way into the home on Sunday. Authorities say a struggled ensued and the man took out a gun. At some point the gun fired and the child was hit in the leg. The man fled the scene.

The child was taken to Jackson Memorial Hospital, where he is recovering.

Family weapons risk: IPV, suicide, mistakes/accidents, cleaning, hunting, drugs

Intentional Self-Directed: Firearm Suicide

- FA Suicide every 17 minutes.
- Handguns -- 70% of firearm related suicides.
- FA Suicide attempts are completed 70-90%. By contrast, only 10-15% of suicide attempts by any other means (i.e. hanging, carbon-monoxide poisoning, pills, or cutting) are fatal.
- The decision to attempt suicide may be made in a matter of hours, and can be averted or medically intervened, if the means is not lethal.
- Most attempters do NOT change their method.

Suicide Risk and Gun Availability

- The relative risk to commit suicide is 5X greater among people living in homes where guns are present compared to people living in homes without a gun.
- For households with members <24 years of age, y/o it is 10X greater.
- The rate of firearm suicide among a cohort of adults who purchased a handgun was 57 times higher in the first week after the purchase than the firearm suicide rate in the U.S. in general.

Nonfatal Injuries: Morbidity and Disability

For every person who dies from a firearm injury, at least two others survive. However, these numbers vary widely based on intent, with selfinflicted injuries much more likely to be fatal. On average, there were more than 98,000 firearm injuries per year between 2003 and 2007.
